EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As a premier university for women, LCWU is committed to providing quality education to empower women through knowledge and skills in order to allow and facilitate their active participation in the socio-economic development of Pakistan and to impact the attitudes and beliefs of its graduates through various programs and activities to emerge as responsible, peaceful and tolerant citizens of the world. Since its establishment, as a college and now university, LCWU has grown in terms of enrollment, emerging trends in education and new research, outreach as well as in seeking funding opportunities.

Faculties and Institutes of LCWU have played a key role to effectively impart quality education and conduct solution oriented research for contribution towards the national goals as a socially responsible and productive component of the community.

During this period, LCWU has not only inducted young Ph.D. faculty in various departments but also has trained the existing faculty through the Directorate of Faculty Development and Internationalization (DFDI). Faculty was also sent abroad in technologically advanced countries through grants by HEC and other international organizations like US AID and British Council. LCWU is imparting mandatory trainings to each member of the university i.e. teaching and management personnel to enhance their professional skills.

Focus on mission to educate and train women to play their role in societal development is a primary preference. This involved preparation of agenda and strategies for academic reforms that have a focus on modern methodological approaches affecting a shift from teacher to student-centered learning, on curriculum development and on enhancing evaluation system. ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

Lahore College for Women University, established in May 1922 as an intermediate residential college, was originally housed in a building on Hall Road, Lahore, with strength of 60 students. By 1950, the college strength increased to 600 students and was shifted to the present building on Jail Road. Lahore College for Women by 1922 was affiliated with the University of the Punjab for its undergraduate Programs in 18 subjects. Post graduate classes were initiated in 1940 and Honors classes were introduced in 1949.

Lahore College for Women University, with a full time enrolment of about 14,000 students and a teaching faculty of more than 500 members, is one of the most prestigious institutions of Pakistan. 

i. REGISTRAR OFFICE

The Registrar's Office of the university serves as the central administrative and academic coordination unit responsible for ensuring the smooth functioning of the institution. It manages academic administration by maintaining university statutes, policies, and academic records, while coordinating with departments on curricula, schedules, and examinations. The office oversees the admission process, registration, and maintenance of student records, as well as the issuance of transcripts, degrees, and verification documents. It supports the university's statutory bodies such as the Syndicate, Academic Council, and Selection Board by preparing agendas, recording minutes, and implementing decisions. The Registrar's Office also handles faculty and staff matters, including appointments, promotions, and service records, and ensures compliance with Higher Education Commission (HEC) regulations and the university's charter. Additionally, it plays a key role in organizing convocations, managing official correspondence, authenticating academic credentials, and liaising with government agencies and other institutions. Through these functions, the Registrar's Office upholds institutional governance, academic integrity, and administrative efficiency within the university.



i. QUALITY ENHANCEMENT CELL



One of the key challenges faced by all Higher Education Institutions is the development, implementation, and sustained maintenance of quality benchmarks across their core performance areas. In response to this need, the Quality Enhancement Cell (QEC) has been established at Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) as a post-accreditation quality assurance mechanism. It serves to ensure continuous performance evaluation, assessment, accreditation, and quality improvement in alignment with national standards. As an integral part of the university structure, QEC is committed to advancing the university's vision by institutionalizing quality assurance processes. Its primary mandate is to develop a system that ensures conscious, consistent, and catalytic improvements in the university's overall performance. The effectiveness of the QEC relies heavily on the active collaboration and cooperation of all stakeholders. DIRECTORATE OF ACADEMICS

The Directorate of Academics plays a central role in planning, coordinating, monitoring, and improving the overall academic quality of the University. The core responsibilities of the Director academics generally include the following:

1. Academic Planning and Policy Development

- Implement and monitor HEC's and universities academic policies, procedures, and regulations.
- Prepares proposals for new academic programs and reviews existing ones.
- Ensures alignment of academic activities with the university's mission, vision, and strategic goals.
- Coordinates with faculties and departments for academic planning and curriculum reforms.

2. Curriculum Design and Review

- Oversees the development, evaluation, and revision of curricula across departments.
- Ensures that all programs meet national accreditation and quality assurance standards (e.g., HEC requirements in Pakistan).
- Facilitates Board of Studies, Board of Faculty, and Academic Council meetings related to curriculum approval.

3. Faculty Coordination and Support

- Coordinates academic activities among faculties, departments, and institutes.
- Supports professional development programs, workshops, and training for faculty members.

Monitors academic workload distribution and teaching schedules.

CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

➤ COMPLETION OF GENERAL EDUCATION COURSE APPROVAL PROCESS

The extensive collection of courses developed across the domains of Social Sciences, Natural Sciences, and Arts & Humanities were presented before all statutory academic bodies, including the Boards of Studies, Boards of Faculty, the Academic Council, and the Syndicate. Their final approval officially institutionalized these courses into LCWU's undergraduate programs, ensuring alignment with HEC's Undergraduate Education Policy.

In continuation of the foundational work carried out in the previous academic year, the Office of the Director Academic Planning successfully led to complete academic approval process for General Education course pools.

➤ INTEGRATION OF ACTIVE CITIZENSHIP INTO THE CURRICULUM

A significant curricular enhancement was the institutionalization of the Active Citizenship Program. This initiative was embedded into the General Education course *Civics and Community Engagement*,

allowing undergraduate students to engage in meaningful social and outreach activities as part of their academic experience.

➤ **OVERSIGHT OF LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (LMS) DEVELOPMENT**

The Office of Director Academic Planning provided strategic supervision in the development and implementation of LCWU's Learning Management System, a key module within the broader Campus Management System (CMS). Nearly 5000 university-wide courses were entered into the system, complete with titles, course codes, credit hours, and semester distribution. Instructor accounts were created, and all departments were guided to upload course outlines, learning outcomes, objectives, and reference literature.

➤ **DEVELOPMENT AND APPROVAL OF POLICY DOCUMENTS**

Two major institutional documents the *Admission Regulations 2025* and the *Registration Regulations 2025*, were drafted by the Director Academic Planning. After extensive consultation with relevant stakeholders, both documents were presented and formally approved by the Academic Council, reflecting the university's commitment to transparent and standardized academic processes.



Department of Gender and Development Studies

➤ Training on the Effective Implementation of Sexual Harassment Law

A three-day residential training on the Effective Implementation of Sexual Harassment Law concluded on 24 August 2025 at Mehergarh: A Center for Learning. The training brought together participants from across Pakistan, representing public and private sector organizations committed to addressing sexual harassment. Prominent institutions such as the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP), Lahore College for Women University, the Veterinary Research Institute Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, the Institute of Space Technology, Islamabad, PRESTON UNIVERSITY ISLAMABAD, The Centrum Media Group, and a representative from Balochistan Ombudsperson's Office joined us for this training, along with students and lawyers, actively took part in the training. During the sessions, Maliha Husain, Executive Director at Mehergarh and lead facilitator Dr Uzma Ahiq Khan Incharge Department of Gender and Development Studies LCWU, provided in-depth insights into the definition of sexual harassment, as well as the roles and responsibilities of employees, senior management, and committee members under the law. She also elaborated on the procedures and timelines for reporting and resolving cases of sexual harassment within organizations. On the third day they tested participants learning during role plays, as standing Inquiry Committee Members.



4. Major Highlights of the Year

4.1 Extraordinary Achievement: Successful Automation of Postgraduate Library & Information Commons

During the reporting year, the Postgraduate Library & Information Commons achieved a landmark milestone

by transitioning from a traditional manual system to a fully automated library environment. Notably, this transformation was accomplished without any internal technical support or additional budget, demonstrating exceptional initiative, resourcefulness, and commitment to service innovation.

Through this successful automation initiative:

- The complete circulation data has been digitized and integrated into the library management system.
- Book issuance and return operations are now fully computerized, ensuring improved accuracy, transparency, and efficiency.
- The legacy manual circulation system has been phased out, significantly reducing processing time and human error.
- Only library card generation remains partially manual, while all other core circulation functions have shifted to an automated workflow.

This development marks a major step forward for the Central Library Network, enhancing user services, optimizing resource management, and aligning with global library standards of modernization and digital transformation. It reflects the university's dedication to advancing a technologically empowered learning ecosystem and fostering a culture of continuous improvement.



4.5 Digital Library – HEC DL (As Focal Person)

The National Digital Library (DL) is an HEC-funded initiative providing universities and research institutions across Pakistan with access to high-quality international scholarly literature through electronic delivery. This ensures faculty, researchers, and students can access peer-reviewed journals, databases, and articles across diverse disciplines. HEC shared bi-annual usage reports with all member institutions to help them monitor and maximize utilization of subscribed databases.

JSTOR showed strong utilization (12,235 downloads), demonstrating high academic relevance. Emerald also reported active usage (2,849 downloads), particularly among business, management, education, and library science disciplines.

Usage Interpretation

- LCWU demonstrated **excellent usage** of core research databases, particularly Springer Link, Wiley, Taylor & Francis, and JSTOR.
- Relatively lower usage of INFORMS suggests:
 - Limited awareness or specialized academic demand; awareness workshops may improve usage.
- Higher usage levels highlight:
 - Growing research culture
 - Frequent need for high-quality literature
- Not subscribed databases reflect financial and procurement limitations shared across public sector institutions.

Recommendations Based on Usage

1. **Continue current subscriptions** (Basic Resources, JSTOR, Emerald) due to high utilization.
2. Encourage ORIC, supervisors, and departments to integrate database links in coursework.
3. Strengthen awareness workshops to boost usage of underutilized categories.
4. Advocate inclusion of:

 - **Ebrary / ProQuest E Book Central**
due to proven need for full-text dissertations and E Book access.





i. OFFICE OF RESEARCH INNOVATION & COMMERCIALIZATION (ORIC)

1. Departmental Achievements – ORIC (2024–2025)

The Office of Research, Innovation and Commercialization (ORIC) at Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) has continued to play a pivotal role in cultivating a dynamic research ecosystem, empowering faculty, and strengthening industry-academia linkages throughout the academic year 2024–2025.

During the reporting year, ORIC made notable developments in strengthening the university's research and innovation landscape. A total of PKR 987,000 was awarded in research publication incentives, and five patent applications were submitted, reinforcing a strong culture of quality scholarship and innovation. ORIC

supported the submission of over 70 research proposals and secured funding for six major interdisciplinary projects worth PKR 38 million, addressing key national and scientific priorities.

A major milestone was the *Industrial Open House 2025*, which brought together academia and industry to showcase student research, promote collaboration, and generate PKR 103,000 in revenue. ORIC also

facilitated faculty travel grants, research recognitions, and a series of fully funded workshops and seminars on grant writing, IP awareness, and international funding opportunities.

Furthermore, 31 new MoUs were signed with academic and industrial partners, expanding opportunities for research collaboration, training, and funding. Looking ahead, ORIC plans to establish a Research Management Unit (RMU), institutionalize the Industrial Open House as an annual event, and further enhance international visibility through expanded grant acquisition and IP commercialization.

2. Faculty Achievements

ORIC played an instrumental role in identifying, mentoring, and endorsing faculty members for prestigious national and international awards, fellowships, and grant opportunities. Notable achievements include selection for successful project approvals, patents filing and invitations to represent LCWU at international forums.

These accomplishments reflect ORIC's commitment to fostering academic excellence and professional growth within the university.



MOLECULAR DIAGNOSTIC LAB PLANT TISSUE CULTURE LAB (Bagh e Jinnah)



Introduction of Central Research Lab

The Central Research lab was established at Lahore College for Women University, Lahore in 2004 under the HEC funded projects and supervision of Dr. Farhat Saleemi as a project director. This Lab has established as a hub for research and development (R&D) activities at Lahore College for Women University Lahore. The Central research facility for all basic science departments aims at achieving high quality R & D activities in experimental techniques by imparting training to researchers in high tech equipment. Establishment of new research laboratory in 2004 was under HEC funded projects in line with the HEC objective to strengthen the high tech research lab equipped with more than 100 instruments such as, Scanning Electron Microscope (SEM), XRD, GC-MS, HPLC, UV-Visible, Atomic Absorption Spectrophotometer, FTIR, High Temperature Furnace, TGA.DTA etc. have made this Central lab distinct among other Universities. The laboratory offers opportunities for scientific research that enable researchers to pursue research in disciplines of biological and physical sciences.

The **molecular diagnostic lab** was established at Lahore College for Women University, Lahore in August 2024, inaugurated by Vice Chancellor Professor Dr. Shagufta Naz under the HEC funded projects. This Lab has established as a hub for research and development (R&D) activities at Lahore College for Women University Lahore for diagnostic purposes. With the rapidly emergence in the field of Science & Technology, molecular diagnostics has evolved as a transformative force, revolutionizing the way of diagnose, treat and prevent diseases. With a team of expert molecular biologists and a commitment to innovation, we are pushing the boundaries of what is possible in molecular diagnosis.

This laboratory is a specialized facility equipped to conduct molecular biology research and diagnostic testing. It focuses on analyzing biological molecules, such as DNA, RNA and proteins. It is highly equipped with specialized equipment's such as thermal cyclers (PCR), electrophoresis apparatus, Gel Doc, Nano drop, ELISA readers, -40 °C, 20 °C refrigerators, Laminar and Fume Hood, shaking incubators etc. It provides services to researchers to perform their molecular research on DNA/RNA Extraction, amplification by Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR), Electrophoresis of PCR products for separating DNA, RNA or proteins based on size and charge for analysis, quantification of DNA and RNA.

The **Plant Tissue Culture Laboratory** at Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) serves as a dedicated facility for research and training in plant biotechnology. The laboratory is equipped to support various plant tissue culture techniques including callus induction, micropropagation, and genetic transformation. It provides a platform for students and researchers to explore plant regeneration, conservation of endangered species, production of disease-free plants, and development of stress-tolerant varieties. The lab contributes to both academic and applied research by facilitating projects related to agricultural biotechnology, plant physiology, and molecular studies, thereby strengthening the university's role in sustainable crop improvement and biotechnological innovation.



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Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) of Central Research Laboratory (CRL) to conduct Experimental Research Work in LCWU

1. The Central Research Laboratory (CRL) provides advanced research facilities to all science departments of Lahore College for Women University (LCWU).
2. A **department-wise log sheets** are maintained to record the details of research students utilizing CRL facilities.
3. Each student issued a **log sheet** by their respective department for entry into CRL, containing information such as date, name, class, number of samples, sample conditions/parameters, and required signatures (student, supervisor, and HOD).
4. Upon approval from the student's supervisor and Head of Department, a specific date and time are allotted for sample analysis, which must be conducted in the presence of both the student and the supervisor.
5. The analytical data/results are provided to the student in digital format (CD or other suitable media).
6. The number of analyses or tests for **BS, MS, and PhD** students is carried out according to the limits sanctioned by the CRL committee.
7. In case additional analyses are required beyond the approved quota, the supervisor may submit a formal request with justification to the **Chief Equipment Maintenance Engineer** for consideration.
8. CRL offers technical assistance to basic science departments in the procurement and installation of scientific equipment's as well.
9. Regular training sessions are organized for departmental laboratory in-charges to ensure proper handling and utilization of equipment placed in their respective departments.
10. Laboratory engineers guide students regarding the appropriate preparation and submission of samples as per equipment requirements.
11. Samples not meeting the required quality or preparation standards will not be accepted for analysis.
12. All students are required to follow laboratory safety protocols, including wearing **masks, gloves, and lab coats** while working within CRL premises.

High Tech. Instruments in Central Research Lab, LCWU

The Central Research Laboratory houses more than 80 advanced instruments, providing state-of-the-art research facilities to scholars from diverse disciplines. Research students actively engage in innovative studies across multiple domains, including nanotechnology, vaccine and drug development, solar batteries, molecular diagnostics, and plant tissue culture. The lab serves as a collaborative platform for interdisciplinary research integrating physics, chemistry, biotechnology, and related sciences. It supports both faculty and students in executing high-quality experimental work. This facility continues to play a pivotal role in advancing scientific innovation and capacity building at the university.



With over 200 participants, the session focused on educating students and faculty members about the diverse international scholarship opportunities available across the globe. Mr. Abidi shared critical insights on preparing effective applications, writing compelling personal statements, and tailoring academic portfolios for competitive international programs. The seminar was interactive and enlightening, particularly for students planning to pursue higher education abroad, and it positioned LCWU's IRC DFDI as a strong resource center for international mobility.



➤ **Seminar on: International Scholarship Opportunities for PHD Scholars 23rd April 2025**

On 23rd April 2025, IRC, DFDI concluded the spring training series with a highly specialized session on "International Scholarship Opportunities for PhD Scholars." Delivered by Dr. Hafsa Amat ur Rasool, the session engaged 35 postgraduate and doctoral participants, providing detailed information on international research opportunities such as the IRSIP (HEC), Commonwealth Split-Site PhDs, and Brain Gain Fellowships. Dr. Hafsa offered expert advice on writing grant proposals, choosing appropriate host institutions, and meeting eligibility requirements for competitive research scholarships abroad.



➤ International Language Hub (ILH) and French Language Course Launch, 16 September 2025

On September 16, 2025, Prof. Dr. Zohra Kayani, Director DFDI, inaugurated the International Language Hub (ILH) under the International Resource Centre (IRC) at Lahore College for Women University (LCWU), reflecting Vice-Chancellor Prof. Dr. Uzma Quraishi's vision of internationalization and global engagement. The event recognized the efforts of Dr. Nausheen Mazhar, Head IRC; Dr. Sana Baig, Program Leader ILH; and Dr. Ayesha Iqbal, developer of the IRC interactive website. The launch also marked the commencement of the first French certificate course (DELF A1) and the unveiling of the IRC website connecting faculty and students to global academic opportunities.



➤ Session on International Law Regarding India and Pakistan Conflict, 19th Sep, 2025

The IRC, DFDI organized a session on *International Law Regarding India and Pakistan Conflict* on September 19, 2025, at the Social Science Building. Prof. Dr. Zohra Nazir Kayani, Director DFDI, graced the event. Dr. Nausheen Mazhar, International Relations Resource Center (IRC) – DFDI, coordinated the event. Renowned speaker Dr. Shakil Ahmed Shah from LUMS was the resource person and, shared valuable insights on the role of international law in regional conflicts with the audience. Faculty and students actively participated and greatly benefited from the session.



Active Citizens (ACP)

Program

➤ ACP Faculty Bootcamp and Capacity Building on 7th to 11th October 2024

The Active Citizens Program (ACP) Bootcamp for Facilitators, organized by the British Council at Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) from October 7-11, 2024, empowered faculty with skills for youth-led community change. Led by ACP team, it focused on civic responsibility, intercultural dialogue, and SDGs. Resource persons included Dr. Moafia Nader (Me & Identity), Dr. Saira Taj (Identity and Culture), Dr. Shabana Manzoor and Dr. Rakshanda Qasim (Local and Global Communities), Dr. Bisma Ejaz (SAP Planning), and Dr. Moneeba Iftikhar (Documentary Making). Activities featured immersive modules with ice-breakers, team-building, identity reflection, community mapping, SMART objective setting, project drafting, video documentation, and facilitation strategies. The workshop enhanced faculty understanding of ACP and SDGs; practical tools for SAP design/evaluation; fostered critical thinking and intercultural dialogue; integrated ACP into courses; built institutional commitment to civic engagement and sustainable development.




➤ Follow-up Session for Fall 2024 ACP Facilitators on 4th February 2025

A follow up session was organized by Dr. Moafia Nader for the review of the ACP projects conducted in the Fall 2024 semester and discussion of improvements for future implementation. This session provided a reflective space for faculty to share their experiences with implementing Social Action Projects (SAPs) in Fall 2024. It allowed

for constructive feedback, identification of challenges, and collective brainstorming for enhancing future project planning and student mentorship.

➤ Orientation for Spring 2025 ACP Facilitators on 11th February 2025

A meeting was held for briefing ACP facilitators teaching the Civic Sense and Community Engagement course in Spring 2025. Dr Moafia Nader & Dr Asma Shahid Kazi led the session. New and returning facilitators were oriented on course expectations, ACP values, and updated resources to ensure consistency in delivering the "Civic Sense and Community Engagement" course, reinforcing ACP integration across departments.



➤ Follow-up Session for Spring 2025 ACP Facilitators on 17 March 2025

An evaluation and feedback session regarding Spring semester ACP activities. Faculty shared ongoing experiences from the Spring semester, discussed emerging needs, and exchanged best practices for managing student-led Social Action Projects, leading to collaborative refinement of facilitation techniques.

➤ Improving My Luck Factor as an ACP Facilitator on 21st May 2025

A session for facilitators was arranged on the 8th of May with Dr. Muhammad Babur on transformative leadership. However due to political circumstances, the session had to be postponed. In lieu of that an online session was arranged on Zoom, on 21st May on the theme "Improving My Luck Factor as an ACP Facilitator. The ACP facilitators Different Ways of Identifying Opportunities and related it to the social action projects they could undertake with their students.

➤ ACP Training for Chairpersons on 26th August 2025

On August 26, 2025, over thirty Chairpersons from Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) participated in a transformative workshop, "Demonstrable Leadership for Active Citizenship Projects: Expanding Our Professional Boundaries & Influence," led by Dr. Muhammad Babur. The session aimed to strengthen departmental leadership for embedding the Active Citizens Programme (ACP) across disciplines. Dr. Babur introduced his 3x3x3 framework—mindset, skillset, toolset; personal, professional, societal roles; and reflective strategies using images, stories, and metaphors. He emphasized Appreciative Inquiry, shifting from deficit-based to strength-based leadership, and explored the "luck factor" to foster resilience and opportunity-making. Activities included reflective exercises, metaphor creation, and discussions on leadership and ACP integration. The Chairpersons gained a strategic understanding of ACP, embraced strength-based leadership, used metaphors for clarity and creativity, and reframed ACP as a tool for resilience and institutional sustainability, empowering them to lead vibrant ACP ecosystems at LCWU.



➤ ACP Faculty Facilitators' Workshop on 27th August 2025

On August 27, 2025, sixty-six (ACP) facilitators from Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) attended a

dynamic training led by Dr. Muhammad Babur. The workshop inspired faculty to view ACP as a creative opportunity to mentor students in Social Action Projects (SAPs) aligned with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Dr. Babur employed Appreciative Inquiry and strength-based leadership through interactive discussions, reflective storytelling, and metaphor-based activities, fostering resilience and resourcefulness in mentoring. Activities included collaborative discussions, storytelling, and crafting metaphors to reframe ACP as a growth-oriented, impactful initiative. Facilitators gained renewed purpose in guiding SAPs, acquired practical tools for facilitation and documentation, and embraced ACP as enriching. The session sparked motivation, resilience, and community spirit, with diverse reflections highlighting creativity and intercultural dialogue. Faculty left energized, ready to nurture students' active citizenship, reinforcing LCWU's commitment to sustainable, opportunity-driven community change.

The training titled "Unlocking Data Insights with Python: From Basic to Analytics" was conducted from March 10 to March 13, 2025. A total of 49 participants attended the program, including one male faculty member and two external faculty members from Government College, Samanabad. The sessions were led by resource persons Dr. Sehar Saleem and Ms. Noor Shahid from the Department of Statistics at LCWU. The training successfully attracted LCWU faculty and students, along with an external participant, demonstrating strong outreach and a growing interest in data science among diverse audiences.



Miracle of Light and Color: Spiritual and Biological Treatment on April 16, 2025

On April 16, 2025, a one-day workshop was held with the objective of guiding participants to discover the path to well-being through light and color therapy, emphasizing both spiritual and biological perspectives. The event was attended by 35 participants, all female, including two external participants, which underscored the expanding interest beyond LCWU. The workshop was led by resource person Prof. Dr. Samina Tazayyen Yousuf Azeemi,


whose expertise contributed significantly to the session. The complete gender representation of the participants highlighted a 100% female participation, reflecting strong engagement and interest among women in holistic approaches to health and well-being.

Short Course on Color Therapy from July 19 to August 3, 2025

The Short Course on Color Therapy was conducted online from July 19 to August 3, 2025, attracting a total of 147 registered participants. This included 89 LCWU students, 12 LCWU faculty members, and 46 external participants, among whom four were males. The course was led by resource person Prof. Dr. Samina Tazayyen Yousuf Azeemi, whose expertise enriched the learning experience. The high number of external participants highlighted the course's significant outreach and wide impact beyond LCWU, reaching both national and international audiences through the online format. The participant demographic was predominantly female, with the inclusion of four males, reflecting a strong interest among women in the field of color therapy.

SPSS Hands-On: Data Analysis for Research and Publication from August 25 to 29, 2025

From August 25 to 29, 2025, a workshop was conducted with a total of 65 registered participants, including 53 from LCWU (students, faculty, and alumni), four external participants from institutions such as Kinnaird College, Superior College, the University of Gujrat, and Shaikh Zaid Medical Complex, among others. The event also featured two male participants, with the remaining 55 being female, highlighting a strong female majority and active male inclusion. Led by resource person Dr. Asifa Kamal, the workshop demonstrated substantial outreach through participation from multiple universities and professional institutes, reflecting robust networking and external collaboration. The diverse participation underscored the event's success in fostering interdisciplinary engagement and expanding professional connections.

Conducted within the Department of Architecture, this series offered discipline-specific professional development opportunities designed to enhance faculty expertise.

It aimed to enhance teachers' commitment, knowledge, and practical skills for effectively managing diverse classrooms. The session also emphasized designing strength-based and personalized curricula and learning materials, alongside implementing pedagogical practices that ensure every student's needs are met. By promoting equity, belonging, and inclusivity, the workshop encouraged educators to create learning environments where all students can thrive.



Media Workshops Series (December 11-13)

A three-day training series by Mr. Usman Ahmed Bhatti, a renowned media expert, was held at the Department of Mass Communication for faculty and students from Mass Communication, Education, and Social Sciences. The first session on Media Ethics (Dec 11) emphasized responsible communication, accuracy, and credibility in digital media. The second session on Entrepreneurship in Media (Dec 12) focused on identifying opportunities and developing sustainable media projects through case studies. The final session on Crisis Management in Media (Dec 13) trained participants in handling communication during crises, ensuring transparency, and protecting institutional reputation.

Embracing the Future - Workshop on AI in Academia (Online: July 2025)

A three-day workshop conducted by Mr. Usman Ahmed Bhatti at the Department of Mass Communication brought together faculty and students from Mass Communication, Education, and Social Sciences. The sessions focused on media ethics, entrepreneurship, and crisis management, emphasizing responsible communication, innovative media practices, and effective strategies for maintaining transparency and credibility during challenging situations.

Professionalism, Collegiality, and Emotional Intelligence for Educators (April 23, 2025)

The workshop, conducted by Professor Dr. Ayaz Muhammad Khan, focused on developing soft skills essential for creating a harmonious and productive academic environment. It provided participants with strategies to foster professional ethics, enhance collegiality, and build emotional intelligence for improved interpersonal relationships.

The session also emphasized effective stress management techniques to promote overall well-being and workplace productivity.

Student Development Training Workshop (September 15, 2025)

The session, conducted by Dr. Afifa Khanam for faculty and undergraduate and postgraduate students, focused on developing essential 21st-century skills—Collaboration, Critical Thinking, and Communication (the 3 Cs). It equipped participants with effective teamwork and conflict-resolution techniques, frameworks for analytical problem-solving and logical decision-making, and practical methods to strengthen both verbal and written communication skills.



17. No plastic Day at LCWU



1. OFFICE OF PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

(FUTURE PLANS)

1. CONSTRUCTION OF HOSTEL FACILITY FOR 400 STUDENTS AT LAHORE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN UNIVERSITY, LAHORE

The university management identified the growing demand for student accommodation factors due to increase in enrollment, especially from rural areas, and lack of suitable accommodation facilities for female students. Frequent requests for safe and secure accommodations for female students have prompted the university to consider this construction project. Moreover, Government policies or initiatives also aimed at improving educational facilities and access to education. Ensuring a conducive and secure environment for learning is a critical factor in the decision-making process. Keeping in view the situation, University management focused on the construction of a hostel facility for 400 students at Lahore College for Women University, Lahore. The primary goal is to address the challenge of providing secure and safe accommodation for female students from rural and underdeveloped areas of Punjab and other provinces who are unable to continue their higher education at the University level. Moreover, the project aimed at expanding the university's housing capacity. For this purpose, P&D Department, LCWU, Lahore and Project Directorate officials visited Forman Christian College, Lahore to review their state-of-the-art hostel on Jan. 23, 2025. Hence LCWU, prepared a project to accommodate 400 students at LCWU Main Camps.

Presently, three hostels are available in the University to accommodate only 562 students against the total strength of more than 20,000 students. A large number of students who come with full momentum of getting higher education but go away because of space constraints. Parents feel insecure to lodge their daughters in available private hostels of the city. Due to the reason, hundreds of students of rural and underdeveloped areas of Punjab and other provinces are unable to continue their higher education at the University.

A hostel having students not only from all localities of the country but also from other countries will help them to learn and groom multicultural norms & values and become a better citizen of the society having emotions of friendship, unity, sympathy, peace and cooperation. The quantifiable objects of the project are as follows;

- i. Construction of hostel facility at an area of 103,801 Sft by an estimated cost of Rs. 1142.660 million for the female students of widespread areas of country, sports players and international students in order to provide them safe and sound environment to complete their higher education.
- ii. Furniture & Fixture amounting to Rs. 128.990 million will be purchased for hostel Students.
- iii. ICT Infrastructure (Reading room with allied facilities) will be provided at an estimated cost of Rs. 128.990 million.
- iv. 04 Project Implementation Staff members will be hired to execute the project at an estimated cost of Rs.18.868 million.



2. ESTABLISHMENT OF WOMEN INNOVATION HUB (WINNO HUB) AT 05 RACE COURSE ROAD, LAHORE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN UNIVERSITY, LAHORE (10-Storey)
The “Establishment of Women Innovation Hub (WINNO HUB)” at 05 Race Course Road, Lahore College for Women University (LCWU), Lahore is a transformative initiative that aims to reshape the landscape of higher education for women in Pakistan particularly in the fields of Information Technology, Computer Science, and Entrepreneurship. This project is a pioneering step by LCWU, one of the oldest and most prestigious women’s institutions in Pakistan, to align its infrastructure and academic vision with the emerging demands of the 21st-century knowledge economy. The proposed WINNO HUB will be constructed on LCWU’s strategically located property at 05 Race Course Road, Lahore, measuring approximately 04 Kanals and 10 Marla, previously underutilized after the relocation of the Treasurer Office in 2010. Recognizing the critical need for modern, high-tech, women-centered academic infrastructure. The university plans to establish a 10-storey building on an area covered area of 140,776 square feet, a multipurpose facility to serve as a hub of innovation, research, and professional development for female students, faculty, and the broader community.
The project is designed not only to expand physical capacity and academic offerings but to redefine how educational institutions can serve as engines of innovation and economic empowerment. At its core, the WINNO HUB will facilitate the practical application of knowledge through:

- Cutting-edge laboratories, including Hi-Tech Diagnostic, Industrial and Agriculture Labs.
- Technology-focused centers such as the Artificial Intelligence Lab, Game Development Center, and Software Houses.
- Media production facilities, including a Web TV and FM Studio.
- Multipurpose spaces for hosting events, exhibitions, and workshops.
- A co-working and incubation space for student entrepreneurs and startups.
- Rooftop restaurants and community engagement zones to generate revenue and increase public interaction.

The WINNO HUB will also support the university’s financial sustainability objectives by

incorporating revenue-generating components, in line with the Higher Education Commission (HEC) guidelines to transition public universities towards greater financial independence.

In essence, the WINNO HUB is more than a building, actually, it is a vision for the future of inclusive, innovative, and economically sustainable higher education in Pakistan.

3. RENOVATION AND UPGRADATION OF EXISTING INFRASTRUCTURE AT LAHORE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN UNIVERSITY, LAHORE

The project is focused on upgradation of existing infrastructure at Lahore College for Women University, Lahore therefore it is a scale up project. The primary goal is to provide a safe efficient and environmentally responsible environment for its community. By addressing the issues of infrastructure decay, energy inefficiency, and safety, this project will significantly enhance the campus's operational efficiency, security, and sustainability. The university is committed to improving its facilities and contributing to a better, greener future, and this project will go a long way in achieving that vision.

Lahore College for Women University (LCWU), established as a premier educational institution for women in Lahore in 1922, has consistently focused on providing quality education and a conducive environment for learning. Over time, however, like many educational institutions, the campus infrastructure has faced the wear and tear of daily use, climatic conditions, and technological advancement. The university's development infrastructure is in need of significant improvements to support the increasing number of students, staff, and visitors. The current state of infrastructure, particularly the road networks, lighting systems, wash rooms, termite treatment, signage, and sustainability measures, no longer meet the needs of the growing university community. Additionally, the lack of energy-efficient systems, such as solar power, have contributed to operational inefficiencies and increased costs.

The proposed project will focus on addressing these critical areas by upgrading the road infrastructure, improving street lighting, improved wash rooms for students, staff and faculty, carrying out termite treatment for university buildings, implementing a new signage system and installing a solar power system throughout the campus. These upgrades will not only enhance the functional efficiency of the university but also contribute to creating a safe, energy-efficient, and environmentally-friendly campus for all stakeholders. Justification of the project is as follows; The engineering estimates of the project will be as follows;

- Road infrastructure throughout the campus will be constructed at an estimated cost of Rs. 73.928 million.
- Lighting systems at all necessary locations will be installed at an estimated cost of Rs.33.301 million.
- Renovation, repair, and upgradation of existing washrooms will be made at an estimated cost of Rs.107.880 million.
- Conduction of comprehensive termite treatment for all buildings will be made at an estimated cost of Rs. 12.550 million.
- Signage work will be completed at an estimated cost of Rs. 5.00 million.

- Solar system will be installed at the roof tops of the University buildings at an estimated cost of Rs.174.00 million.

4. ESTABLISHMENT OF INDEPENDENT LIVING CENTER AT LAHORE COLLEGE FOR WOMEN UNIVERSITY, LAHORE

Lahore College for Women University, Lahore, is a prestigious institution that provides higher education to female students in various disciplines. However, students with disabilities face significant barriers in terms of accessibility, mobility, social inclusion and independence. Despite the university's efforts to create a supportive atmosphere, a dedicated facility that addresses the specific needs of disabled students is lacking. The establishment of an Independent Living Center will address these challenges by providing the necessary infrastructure, resources, and services for students with disabilities, empowering them to live independently and participate fully in university life. LCWU is committed to fostering an inclusive educational environment where all students, regardless of physical or mental disabilities, are provided equal opportunities to excel. In line with this vision, the establishment of an Independent Living Center for Disabled Students is proposed to ensure the autonomy, independence, and overall well-being of students with disabilities. This center will offer resources, facilities, and support systems that will enable disabled students to live, learn, and thrive in a university environment with dignity, security, and confidence.

- There has been a growing demand for inclusive education and accessibility for students with disabilities. The move towards integrating students with disabilities into general education environments has highlighted the
- need for additional resources to support their transition to adulthood. Independent living centers can offer a personalized and supportive environment to help students gain essential life skills and independence.
- There is a growing demand and importance of preparing students with disabilities for employment. This center will help students to develop the skills necessary for long-term career success after completing their higher education.
- A well-established, accessible center could increase demand significantly, especially if students are informed about the center's facilities, support services, and the overall ease it provides in managing their academic and personal lives.
- After the establishment of ILC, students not only from Lahore & its surrounding areas but also from Rajanpur, Layyah, Muzaffargarh, Dera Ghazi Khan, Bahawalnagar, Rahim Yar Khan, Bhakkar and Vehari etc. will be able to get higher education at the University level.

The quantifiable objects of the project are as follows;

- i. An independent living center will be constructed at an area of 6400 Sft by an estimated cost of Rs. 60.834 million.
- ii. 04 Project Implementation Staff members will be hired to execute the project at an estimated cost of Rs.12.269 million



4. Expansion of Journal Publication Efforts


The department ensured consistent publication of its HEC Y-Category recognized **Journal of Research in Psychology**, promoting high-quality academic research nationally and internationally.



Lahore College Health Centre is an OPD unit with a three bed observation room serving more than 17,000 students, faculty members, staff and residential employees. At present, LCHC is providing following services

- Medical consultation and counselling.
- First aid.
- Blood pressure, blood sugar level and temperature assessment.
- Provision of selective oral and injectable medicines
(the hostel residents are provided with two days course of available medicines) whereas the day scholars and faculty members are provided with the medicines for the time they remain on campus.
- Basic emergency facilities like Nebulization and Oxygen inhalation, if required.
- In case of emergencies, a fully equipped ambulance with driver available 24 HRS to shift the girls to a nearby hospital



Department-wise student participation in Change Maker Competition - Dec 2024







Introduction

The rapid advancement of digital technology has transformed communication and interaction patterns across the globe. Information now travels instantly, connecting people with wider audiences and reshaping the ways in which ideas are shared. In this environment, concise, visually engaging, and information-rich video communication has emerged as one of the most effective means of outreach.

Recognizing this shift, the Department of Mass Communication, Lahore College for Women University (LCWU), launched Web TV LCWU on April 4, 2020. The initiative was conceived by Dr. Naveed Iqbal, Assistant Professor, Department of Mass Communication / Director Web TV, during the COVID-19 pandemic to bridge the communication gap between faculty and students during lockdown. Web TV became a timely solution for disseminating lectures, research, academic information, and institutional updates at a moment when physical mobility was severely restricted.

Over the past five years, Web TV LCWU has grown into a dynamic digital platform, effectively serving students, faculty, and the wider public. Its contributions include:

- **Educational Support:** Dissemination of lectures, research activities, and academic policies to ensure continuity of learning during disruptions.
- **Promotion of Research & Innovation:** Providing a platform for discussions, research debates, and academic discourse.
- **Event Coverage:** Successful live streaming of LCWU's convocations, international seminars, symposiums, and conferences.
- **Public Engagement:** Serving as an outreach tool for knowledge sharing, innovation promotion, and community engagement.



The success of this initiative has been made possible through the consistent support of the University's leadership. Successive Vice Chancellors have endorsed the project, and the current Vice Chancellor, **Prof. Dr. UzmaQuraishi**, continues to patronize and strengthen Web TV LCWU.



Building upon its strong foundation, Web TV LCWU has also played a pivotal role in documenting and disseminating the university's international academic engagements. By covering major scholarly gatherings, conferences, and workshops, it has ensured that global collaborations and intellectual exchanges are shared widely with both local and international audiences. Following are the details of the research events covered and disseminated through Web TV.



INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES & COLLABORATIONS (2024–2025)

During 2024–25, Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) continued its tradition of global academic engagement by hosting and collaborating in several prestigious international conferences, seminars, and workshops across diverse disciplines.

- **6th International Punjabi Zuban, Adab, Fan o Saqafat Conference** was successfully hosted, promoting Punjabi language, literature, art, and culture through academic and literary dialogue.
- **International Workshop on City & Regional Planning** was organized in collaboration with Technical University Dortmund, UET Lahore, LCWU, and NUST. - **Pak–UK Education Gateway: Student Mobility Partnership** under British Council & HEC funding facilitated academic exchange between LCWU and the University of Bolton, UK. Three international students undertook research at LCWU, while LCWU PhD scholars shared their UK experiences. Knowledge-sharing sessions, IT infrastructure briefings, and digital content training workshops were conducted during their stay.

- **1st International Seerat Conference** was organized by the Department of Arabic Language & Literature, Faculty of Islamic and Oriental Learning, LCWU. The conference highlighted Seerat-un-Nabi (PBUH) and its relevance to contemporary society.



- **International Conference on Contemporary Trends in South Asian Politics** brought together political scientists and researchers to deliberate on regional and global developments.
- **4th International Conference on Research, Policy, and Practices in Education** focused on teacher education reforms and pedagogical innovation. Keynote speakers from the USA, UK, and Pakistan highlighted the importance of the “4Cs” (creativity, critical thinking, communication, collaboration) in modern education. A special session chaired by Prof. Dr. Uzma Qureshi featured HEC and British Council-funded research projects on STEM education, graduate employability, and student exchange.
- **Seminar on Traditional & Non-Traditional Security Challenges to Pakistan**, organized by the Department of International Relations in collaboration with Pakistan Navy War College, examined governance, maritime, border, and energy security, as well as refugee-related challenges.
- **4th Science International Conference on Recent Advances in Photonics & Physical Sciences** was organized by the Physics Department with global partners including SPIE, PSF, UNC Charlotte, and COMSATS. The three-day event featured distinguished scientists from the USA, UK, Germany, Romania, China, Malaysia, and Canada.
- **International Conference on Technology-Driven Climate Action (DepWisen Project)** was jointly organized with BUIITEMS, NED Karachi, University of Glasgow, and Middlesex University London.
- **2nd Vice Chancellors' Conference (PHEC)**







The Women Empowerment and Mentoring Program (WEMP) at Lahore College for Women University (LCWU) has emerged as a landmark initiative fostering women's leadership, academic growth, and professional empowerment. Launched under the vision of LCWU's leadership with guidance from the Higher Education Commission (HEC) and National Academy of Higher Education (NAHE), the program has created a sustainable mentoring culture for women faculty and researchers.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS


- The inaugural WEMP cohort at LCWU involved **12 mentors** guiding **27 mentees** with more than **100 one-on-one mentoring engagements** and six collective sessions over the first three-month cycle.
- Building on that success, the second cohort expanded to **36 mentors** and **110 mentees**.
- The program led to the creation of individual **Professional Development Plans (PDPs)** for all mentees and the identification of leadership potential among faculty, particularly women.
 - Established structured mentorship model linking senior and junior faculty across disciplines.
 - Developed over 130 individualized Professional Development Plans (PDPs).
 - Organized policy dialogues, capacity-building workshops, and leadership training sessions.
 - Expanded from 12 mentors and 27 mentees in the first cohort to 36 mentors and 110 mentees in the second.
 - Created a ripple effect—mentored women now leading research, academic, and administrative initiatives.

Cohort 3 will expand international collaboration, policy research, and mentorship for women faculty across South Asia and beyond.

As a result of WEMP and related initiatives, LCWU has strengthened its role as a center of empowerment for women in higher education, enabling them to move from teaching roles to leadership, research, policy-making, and institutional governance.



1. Podcasts & Seminars


Podcasts: More than 40 podcasts of national and international alumni were recorded who shared their career journeys, professional advice, and inspirational life stories.




